He was bishop in Palestinian Lydda. They shone as stars in the darkness of paganism, and brought many to the Christian Faith. Now they shine as stars in the Kingdom of Christ, their Beloved.

Orthodox Thoughts from Theo, the Parish Possum



The Orthodox possum family under your altar can see what is happening in the church through small cracks. We are very moved by the devotion shown by all of you as you venerate the icons and receive the Holy Gifts. Many of you light candles. This is a very important part of Orthodox worship. We have a possum-sized candle stand in our own

icon corner. We light them as we pray, making this an offering to accompany our prayers. Orthodox typically light candles when coming into the church and that is usually the best time to light them. There are times when candles should not be lit. It is not proper to light candles during the Epistle or Gospel readings, during the Little or Great Entrances and most of the times when the faithful are standing. If you find yourself entering the church after the Liturgy has begun, it's best to wait until everyone is seated to light a candle. A good rule of thumb is to avoid lighting a candle if folks are standing or a sermon is in progress. May you and your family find this helpful as you worship our Lord. Blessings to all—Theo
