

Please do not be offended by this if you are not an Orthodox Christian or in good standing with the Church. We welcome you to our church and invite you to receive a blessing and partake of the blessed bread at the end of the Divine Liturgy.

In our tradition... the church temple is a house of prayer. Upon entering it, please refrain from unnecessary conversation before, during and after church services, most especially during the Divine Liturgy from the time of the consecration of the Gifts until the last person has received the Eucharist. At the end of the Divine Liturgy, please come quietly forward to receive a piece of the antidoron and exit the church temple without talking. During coffee hour in the Church Hall is the appropriate place to exchange personal greetings and converse with one another. May God bless your reverence and piety.

Orthodox Thoughts from Theo, the Parish Possum



The Orthodox possum family under your altar can see what is happening in the church through small cracks. We are very moved by the devotion shown by all of you as you venerate the icons and receive the Holy Gifts. Many of you light candles. This is a very important part of Orthodox worship. We have a possum-sized candle stand in our own

icon corner. We light them as we pray, making this an offering to accompany our prayers. Orthodox typically light candles when coming into the church and that is usually the best time to light them. There are times when candles should not be lit. It is not proper to light candles during the Epistle or Gospel readings, during the Little or Great Entrances and most of the times when the faithful are standing. If you find yourself entering the church after the Liturgy has begun, it's best to wait until everyone is seated to light a candle. A good rule of thumb is to avoid lighting a candle if folks are standing or a sermon is in progress. May you and your family find this helpful as you worship our Lord. Blessings to all—Theo

The Parish Council is always looking for ways to enhance the beauty of our church and worship services. About a year ago some of us considered the possibility of purchasing a bell. Unfortunately, the belfry on our church is not designed to hold a bell. We made inquiries about the cost of a bell that could be placed in a frame or structure near the church entrance and used during the liturgy. ANNOUNCEMENTS

The **Advent Fast** began Saturday, November 15^{th} , and is divided into two periods. The first period is Nov. 15 - Dec. 19, with the traditional fasting discipline observed (no meat, poultry, dairy, eggs, fish, alcohol and oil). There is an allowance, however, for alcohol and oil on Tuesdays and Thursdays, and an allowance for alcohol, oil and fish on Saturdays and Sundays. The second period is Dec. 20 - 24, with the traditional fasting discipline observed. There is an allowance, however, for alcohol and oil only on Saturday and Sunday.

The **Parish Council** is scheduled to hold their November meeting today, Nov. 15, after Divine Liturgy. All Council members please attend.
