



We welcome you to our church and invite you to receive a blessing and partake of the blessed bread at the end of the Divine Liturgy.

In our tradition... *the church temple is a house of prayer. Upon entering it, please refrain from unnecessary conversation before, during and after church services, most especially during the Divine Liturgy from the time of the consecration of the Gifts until the last person has received the Eucharist. At the end of the Divine Liturgy, please come quietly forward to receive a piece of the antidoron and exit the church temple without talking. During coffee hour in the Church Hall is the appropriate place to exchange personal greetings and converse with one another. May God bless your reverence and piety.*

Orthodox Thoughts from Theo, the Parish Possum



While we cannot catch the Corona virus, the possum family under the altar has been worried that parishioners might get sick. We are glad that so many of you are wearing masks and are keeping proper distance during the Liturgy. We were listening to Father Peter's sermon recently on our Lord's parable about the king who invited many people to his son's wedding banquet. All the invited guests came up with excuses for why they could not attend. One had to look after new oxen. One had to inspect land he had just purchased. Another was celebrating his own wedding. The king was furious that they should reject a royal invitation. He then ordered his servants to gather "the poor, the crippled, the blind and the lame" from the streets until the banquet hall was filled. Sadly, we all make excuses for the choices we make. Like the king's invited guests, our priorities are often misplaced. Our Lord's parable equates the king's banquet with the heavenly banquet that awaits us if we would just accept the invitation. The poor in body and spirit ended up at the royal table. The lesson for us is that Orthodox living should not be focused on earthly cares, possessions or even about our relationships. As Father Peter said, it is really all about the banquet. Thanks be to God! —Theo

ANNOUNCEMENTS

Dear Parishioners, we reported to you recently that we had some folks in the parish who tested positive with the Covid virus. Meanwhile, recent data from Jefferson Parish indicate alarming increases in people who have become sick. We have a moral, civil and legal obligation to protect one another and our parishioners from the infection. For the time being, we must ask that you **do not attend services** unless you are wearing a face mask. We have a limited supply of masks for those who do not have one. Inside the church, unless you are in a family, please distance yourself at least 6 feet from others. The reception of Holy Communion is encouraged, but, as always, is optional.

We understand that some of you object to wearing masks in church. However, we are people under authority. After consulting His Grace Bishop NICHOLAS and reviewing His Eminence Metropolitan JOSEPH’S directives, we must comply with Jefferson Parish regulations, which require masks and social distancing. Our Dean is also directing us to take these steps. Most Orthodox parishes are following more stringent requirements than we are asking for at this time.

At the present, our choir is restricted to the choir director and three choir members. There is no coffee hour or church school. With the blessings of His Grace Bishop NICHOLAS, our annual Parish meeting scheduled for February is postponed at least until March. We will continue to evaluate our response to the Covid virus on a weekly basis. Please pray for the Parish and the health of all parishioners.

Church calendars, house blessing forms, pledge forms and boxes of offering envelopes for 2021 for each family in the parish are now available in the dining room of the church hall. Please be sure to get yours this Sunday.

Our Annual Pledge Drive is currently underway for the calendar year 2021. All adult members of the parish are encouraged to complete and return a pledge form to the church office. Pledge forms may be found in

the narthex of the church building. All pledges are held in strict confidence. Only the total number of pledges and the total pledge amount is made available to the public. Your financial support of our church community is your support of yourself and your contribution to help insure you and your family has a place to worship. Thank you and God bless you.
