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

Euphrosyne was the daughter of Paphnutius, a wealthy and distinguished man of Alexandria. Her childless parents had besought God with prayer for the birth of a child, and they were given her. Her devout parents raised their daughter in the Christian Faith. Not wanting to enter into marriage, the young Euphrosyne hid from her father, changed into men's clothing, and presented herself to the abbot of a monastery as a eunuch of Emperor Theodosius, giving the name Smaragdus. The abbot received her, and turned her over to the spiritual father Agapitus for guidance. By her fasting and prayerful asceticcism, Smaragdus quickly surpassed all the monks in that monastery. When she had completed 38 years of strict asceticism, her father Paphnutius visited that monastery, and the abbot directed him to Smaragdus for prayer and counsel. Smaragdus recognized Paphnutius, but Paphnutius did not recognize Smaragdus. When the father confessed his grief for his lost daughter, Smaragdus told him not to lose hope, for he would see his daughter again in this life, and besought him to come again within three days. When Paphnutius came again, Smaragdus was on her deathbed. The dying one said to Paphnutius: "I am Euphrosyne, your daughter; you are my father!" For a long time, the father was unable to come to himself due to his severe shock. Then, the Blessed Euphrosyne breathed her last, and her father wept over her. After burying her, Paphnutius himself entered the monastery, and settled in the cell of his holy, reposed daughter. After 10 years of asceticism, Paphnutius also entered into rest in the Lord.

Orthodox Thoughts from Theo, the Parish Possum



After the liturgy one Sunday, while in our den under the altar, I heard some folks talking about how the church now has so many non-Arab members including Slavs, Greeks, Ethiopians and "Americans." Some were apprehensive about this. Others said that welcoming them was essential to the church's growth. It seems that St. Basil Parish was founded mainly by Arab-

American Christians some 45 years ago. However, even then, it advertised services in English, Russian, Greek, and Arabic. The American Antiochian Orthodox Church, of which it is a part, was founded by a Syrian, St. Raphael (Hawaweeny). While his plan was mainly to provide a church home for Arabic-speaking Christians, he was ordained as the first Orthodox bishop in America by the Russian Orthodox Church wearing vestments given to him by Tsar Nicholas II. He established a church in Brooklyn in 1895 and started 30 parishes throughout the United States. He also assisted in the founding of St. Tikhon's Monastery, started The Word magazine, and recommended the use of our current English Service Book. He once said that he had been sent to America to tend the flock of Christ whether they be "Russians, Slavs, Syro-Arabs or Greeks." He rested from his labors in 1915. He was glorified in 2000 by the Orthodox Church in America with the participation of the Antiochian and Greek Archdioceses. Our church has an icon of St. Raphael containing the saint's relics. Through the prayers of the Holy Bishop Raphael, may we always be a home for all Orthodox people—Theo
